professional vehicles.


MITA would also like to highlight the commitments demonstrated by the fol-

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HOFFMAN BROS.INC. **FXCAVATING CONTRACTORS**

offman Bros., Inc., is all about carrying on the family tradition. The tradition began in 1947 when brothers Ed and Hollis Hoffman purchased a bulldozer and dump truck and began taking advantage of the construction boom after World War II. Hollis ran the bulldozer and Ed ran the dump truck. They dug basements, graded driveways in Battle Creek, and probably had no idea what the eventual results of their hard work and determination would be.

Their success came gradually, as all good things do. They eventually hired an employee. And then more employees. They bought more equipment. And then more equipment. Almost 30 years went by, they built families, and in 1974 Ed's twin sons, Jack and Jim, purchased the company from their father and uncle.

standards that we are known for," said Brian, the father of a daughter, and two sons, one of whom may soon join the company after college. "Today, we have over 103 employees and a large fleet of equipment handling projects mainly within 120 miles of Battle Creek."

Over the years, Hoffman Bros. expanded from basements and driveways to handle some of the largest and complex projects in their region. They are considered to be a regional leader in the implementation of laser and GPS machine control technology, with countless robotic total stations to read slope distances. For over 15 years automated machine control has enabled them to consistently complete large, complex projects ahead of schedule and under budget, Brian explained. The types of projects they are currently capable of handling include: road, highway and airport construction; sitework; underground construction; and recycling asphalt and concrete in their own yard adjacent to their main offices.

Some key current projects include the new Jackson National office site near Okemos; Michigan State University Steam Tunnel; Hillsdale Airport perimeter road realignment; Maple Valley Schools sitework; street work in Auburn, Indiana; and the Festival Plaza in Battle Creek among many other jobs throughout the state.

Past projects include the Four Winds Casino in New Buffalo, earthwork and utility infrastructure; CSO Control in Lansing, sewer separation; I-94 business loop in Benton Harbor; reconstruction of 1.78 miles of I-94 BL through downtown Benton Harbor; W.K. Kellogg Airport Runway, Battle Creek; Kalamazoo River inverted siphon replacement in Battle Creek; and Downtown Battle Creek Transformation Streetscape, which is a complete reconstruction of Michigan Avenue.

Throughout all their project work over the years, Brian said that being members of MITA has helped them stay on top of issues and ahead of challenges, especially in the safety arena with the assistance of Rob Coppersmith, MITA's Vice President of Membership Services. Annual safety training, provided by MITA, includes CPR, First Aid, Trench, Qualified Person, Traffic Regulator and Confined Space. Hoffman Bros. also takes advantage of support from MITA's engineering staff.

"Their dedication to safety training is

what is remarkable about Hoffman Bros.," Rob said. "What I always remember about them is that when I look at the date they joined over 20 years ago, I realize that they have never missed a year when it comes to providing annual safety training to their crews. In the old days of AUC, they never missed a Super Conference, either. They definitely take advantage of this service and everything else MITA has to offer construction workers."

Through the years of steady growth, Brian notes the challenges of "finding construction-oriented people in this generation."

"We have it a little easier than others because we are located in a rural area, and rural farming folks are more apt to be attracted to our industry," Brian said. "This helps us keep up with our workforce demands, but it is definitely a challenge."

Brian is grateful for the increase in private work recently, and the fact that the company is at least as busy if not busier than last year.

"It is looking better," he said, "and I always tend to see things as partly sunny rather than partly cloudy."

MITA Participates in Underground and Road Safety Events

uring the spring, MITA participated in two events that focused on worker safety. The events allowed MITA to speak on behalf of all our members. Here are the comments written and made by me at the MISS DIG Safety Event.

"I am here today wearing a couple of hats. My first in the role at the Michigan Infrastructure and Transportation Association, or MITA, is to work with and train the excavation community in a joint effort with MISS DIG on safe work practices. I'm happy to report that thousands of Michigan construction workers have been trained on utility locating over the last several months.

I am also here in my role as chairman of the Michigan Damage Prevention Board, an entity formed to develop best practices for utility locating and the work being performed around them. This group was instrumental in the development of legislation that resulted in PA 174,

which took place a little over a year ago. The goal of the group is to continually work toward the protection of facilities and develop best practices for those who work around them or are served by them. Seems simple? It would be, until you start factoring in the enormity of this task which involves over 700,000 ticket requests on an annual basis, requests which are then relayed to countless facility owners, which then requires marking and a positive response back into the system within 72 hours of a request. Last year alone over 12 million transmissions were made in the ticketing system to achieve this task, which is daunting by any standard.

These roles are often at odds with each other until you remember the ultimate goal — public safety. Our regular meetings are not filled with joyful banter. They are filled with spirited debate that tries its best to balance the needs of utility owners with the demands of expedited construction

schedules put in place in order to not inconvenience the public. Damages and marking related issues hurt all of us in a variety of ways: disruption of service to home and business, construction delays and related costs, facility repair and associated costs, and in the worst case scenario the loss of life – what is known as the ultimate cost.

I firmly believe that the actions achieved by the various stackholders, who are often at odds, could not have been accomplished if we all were not drive by the common goal of safety. In this arena, safety is easily defined: "NO DAMAGES." How that is accomplished takes a group effort between facility owners, the MISS DIG system, locating contractors and excavators. One hiccup from any group can result in costly and grave consequences.

So, as we embark on another one of my favoritie seasons – "construction" – it is my sincere hope

During the spring, MITA participated in two events that focused on worker safety. The events allowed MITA to speak on behalf of all our members. Here are the basic comments made by me at the Work Zone Safety Event in East Lansing. MITA's Douglas Needham, P.E., made similar comments during the event at the Clare Welcome Center.

"MITA works endlessly with its industry partners to make roads safer for contractors by providing thousands of hours of training on an annual basis to contractor employees. In addition, MITA, MIOSHA, risk professionals, and MDOT perform hundreds if not thousands of construction site visits a summer to assist and monitor contractor jobsites to ensure safety practices are understood and in place. This is all done in an effort to make jobsites as safe as possible for construction workers.

In spite of these training and safety efforts, construction employees often have to report to work in less than favorable conditions. Daily the industry is faced with an apathetic driving public that tends to focus on how they have been

inconvenienced by construction work being performed on their behalf. Many workers during their training sessions talk of the distractions that drivers exhibit on a daily basis: swerving, texting, applying make-up, eating breakfast, reading newspapers, not to mention the more depraved act of drunk driving. The latter is something our workers are facing on a regular basis as more night work is being performed in an effort to appease the traveling public. But, I ask you, to what end?

The construction industry offers a good living to those who work in it, however, how long will the industry be able to attract good help if met with a constant threat of poor driving and your prize at the end of the day is getting a section of highway named after you once you've paid the ultimate sacrifice for being a construction worker.

The construction industry is doing its part; however, with training, traffic control devices and monitoring, the industry can only do so much. We ultimately need the driving public to step up to the challenge. No more racing to the head of

a lane merge to save what amounts to a minute or two; no longer engaging in any behavior that could cause a distraction; and, finally viewing construciton workers as people with families who need them to come home at the end of the day.

It is my sincere hope that we can leave here today with the following positive message for the construction industry:

- A message that lets construction workers know that the people they are performing work for will no longer curse construction work, but understand that Michigan has underfunded our road resources to the point of decay and that it will take time, proper funding, and some inconvenience to put us back on track.
- A message that says drivers will change their driving habits before more laws have to be introdued.
- A message that says the driving public is committed to just giving road workers a brake! Thank you!"

E-construction.... A Game Changer!

ust as MDOT's implementation of | electronic bidding revolutionized and improved the physical bidding process back in 2001, today's MDOT "e-construction" initiative looks to be a similar game changer in terms of the way all project documents are collected, shared, distributed and managed in a secure and protected electronic environment. Favorable results and overwhelming acceptance of the e-construction process by both MDOT and contractor personnel on several pilot projects in 2013 and 2014 prompted MDOT (with MITA's support) to implement e-construction on all trunkline projects in the October 2014 bid letting and going forward.

In the simplest terms, MDOT's e-construction initiative primarily involves the implementation of an electronic document management system that eliminates the physical handling of essentially all hard copy construction documents on a project. A key secondary piece of automation MDOT implemented in early 2012, to facilitate the electronic submittal of contract documents, was the allowed and encouraged use of digitally



encrypted electronic signatures.

E-construction also involves improved electronic communication via a variety of mobile devices and network applications.

MDOT uses the Bentley Systems ProjectWise suite of software in their implementation of e-construction. The ProjectWise software has no specific hardware or processor requirements and can be loaded on a variety of laptops, tablets, and other mobile devices. Under its current licensing agreement with Bentley, MDOT provides the ProjectWise software to contractor and consulting firms without charge. At the time of this writing, about 270 contractor and consulting firms (1,000+ users) have been authorized as ProjectWise users.

For the delivery of the 2013 and 2014 pilot projects MDOT utilized targeted ProjectWise training of MDOT and contractor personnel to ensure a common understanding of the e-construction document management procedures and requirements. ProjectWise training today is facilitated by scheduled webinars or by special request. The "click-drag-drop" technology used to physically submit a document is relatively simple to master, however, there is a short learning curve for most users to become proficient and understand the file naming conventions and attributes, roles, permissions and workflow

requirements.

Beyond the countless forests of trees that will be saved as MDOT projects go "paperless" with e-construction, the following are the most significant anticipated benefits of e-construction we see for a contractor:

Transparency and access to documents – All construction documents will be accessible on any device at any time. The document management software will maintain an audit trail for a document's timelines, status, and possessions, virtually eliminating disputes over document submittal. Project plans (including revisions), specifications, and inspector daily reports (IDR) (including attachments) will be accessible in real time.

Faster flow of information –
As automation improves
communications and document
sharing, submittal review and
approval timeframes can be
reduced significantly. With the
real time sharing of all construction
documents errors can be discovered
and corrected in a more timely and
efficient manner.

Improved cash flow – Real time access to IDRs for daily reconciliation of quantities and validation of pay estimate quantity postings will ensure contractor payments are timely and accurate. Electronic document sharing, combined with the use

of electronic signatures, will ensure contract modifications are reviewed, approved and processed for payment expeditiously.

MDOT's e-construction efforts are being promoted nationally by the Federal Highway Administration as a successful model innovation under their Every Day Counts (EDC) Round 3 initiative. The departments of transportation in several states are considering or have already decided to implement e-construction efforts that are based on, or mirror, MDOT's initiative.

In 2016, MDOT is anticipating they will expand the implementation of e-construction by enabling county and local agencies to utilize the technology on projects they let through MDOT.

We encourage every MITA member contractor (and our consulting firms) to embrace MDOT's e-construction technology to make it work for the maximum benefit of your companies.



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hile the road funding debate in Michigan certainly gets a lot of attention, especially due to the fact that it has been discussed publicly for several years, it isn't the only focus that our association or the Government Affairs division has. On a parallel path, we have also been working hard for our underground members and towards a goal of some permanent state

funding for our underground water

and sewer systems.

As many in the industry know, our underground systems are in even worse shape than our roads and bridges. It's easy to see cracks in pavement, potholes or falling concrete from bridges, but the public and elected officials usually ignore our underground infrastructure system because it is unseen. As long as our water seems cleans and our toilets flush, many don't understand the dire situations that many communities have been dealing with regarding their underground infrastructure.

Several years ago, MITA began a lengthy process of securing funding for our underground systems throughout Michigan. MITA staff sat on the State Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund Advisory Committee, which was established to review and provide recommendations regarding the State Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund. The Committee's goals were to increase the level of investment in sewage collection and treatment systems, as well as to provide incentives for action that improve water quality and prevent



pollution. The outcome of this initial step was releasing the remaining \$654 million in bonds for various asset management studies and projects in various communities throughout the state.

Stormwater, Asset Management, and Wastewater (SAW) Grants

Legislation was passed in 2013 to develop the new SAW grant program. This legislation

established grants for asset management plan development, stormwater plan development, sewage collection and treatment plan development, and state-funded loans to construct projects identified in the asset management plans. Communities jumped at the opportunity to use these new grants and 673 applications were received by the DEQ by December 2013, which was the initial cut-off for applications. It is estimated


that it will take up to six years for all of the grants and loans to be distributed, with approximately \$100 million each year being appropriated by the state. The idea is to get communities to understand their underground infrastructure needs so that they can begin to plan on how funding for those needs may look. Despite having the necessary information on the needs each community may have in their underground infrastructure, many will still lack the ability to find funding for those various maintenance improvements. Understanding this struggle, MITA began working on ways to collect the various asset management plans throughout Michigan to be able to showcase the entire state's needs to policy-makers and the public.

Michigan Underground Asset Management Council

In 1997, when the Legislature last increased Michigan's gas tax to support our deteriorating roads and bridges, the Michigan Transportation Asset Management Council was established to rate Michigan's roads and bridges and to predict their condition into the future. The program is now viewed as one of the top rating systems throughout the entire United States and has been a valuable tool in convincing lawmakers of the need for increased funding for our transportation system (although convincing them of the need doesn't necessarily equate to actually solving the problem). Because our underground system is typically overlooked, as it is unseen by the public,

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

MITA is working on establishing an underground asset management council here in Michigan. Starting last year and continuing this year, the DEQ budget in Michigan included language that establishes a standard set of requirements for each community to follow in their asset management plans, as well as a process for communities to keep and report to the DEQ. The idea is to collect all of the various plans throughout the state and potentially house them at a research university in Michigan to begin this new council.

Research Facility

When the Transportation Asset Management Council was established, Michigan Technological University was tasked with establishing criteria for rating Michigan's transportation system. We believe the same can be done for our underground system at one of the many fine universities in Michigan. MITA will be working on securing grant money to become available through the state budget for a university that might want to establish criteria for rating our underground water and sewer systems and creating a way to house and present those findings to the public. One other challenge is that the information is collected in a variety of ways. Having one research facility overseeing all of the asset management plans developed by individual communities can help define a

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more uniform rating system throughout the state.

Educating Policy Makers and the Public

Once a good portion of communities in Michigan have established their asset management plans, data has been collected by a research facility, and those systems have been rated in a uniform way, MITA can begin to educate the public and policy makers on the dire need for increased



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investments into our underground infrastructure. The road funding debate didn't heat up on its own, or overnight. It took years for those involved in the industry to convince the public and lawmakers that our system was failing and we needed to invest more to maintain it. There is little debate that we need more money to improve our roads and bridges in Michigan, however, not many people believe that we need to invest more into our underground infrastructure. This it because they are not educated on the conditions of the various systems. MITA believes that by exposing our water and sewer systems throughout Michigan, there will be an even larger cry for increased investment into those systems statewide.

Increased Investment into our Underground Infrastructure

The ultimate goal in all of this is to secure increased investment for our underground infrastructure throughout Michigan. Does that come in more opportunities for communities to tap into funds within the state budget? Does that come from some sort of user fee statewide that everyone in Michigan pays? Does that come from some other source that is yet to be determined? What is painfully obvious to us at MITA is that the general public and those elected officials in Lansing and elsewhere have no idea about the extreme conditions that some of our water and sewer systems are in and what decades of ignoring the problem has created underground for our citizens. Like the road funding debate, this is an ongoing strategy that MITA has been working on since its inception and will continue to work on until we are successful.




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Q&A LEGISLATIVE QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Speaker Kevin Cotter, R - Mount Pleasant

- 0: What can we learn from the recent defeat of Proposal 1, and how will it affect the future of increased road funding in Michigan?
- A: The people of Michigan want their roads fixed, but they don't want an overly complicated plan that tries to fix everything in state government. We need to keep road funding simple, and keep it focused on the needs it is supposed to address.
- Q: As Speaker, what do you feel

- is the next step towards adequately funding our infrastructure in Michigan?
- A: We have already introduced legislation that will increase funding for Michigan's roads and bridges by more than a billion dollars, reprioritizing funding from other sources and showing that transportation infrastructure really is a priority in this state. We need to consider this reform and begin talks with the Senate and Governor about their plans to address this issue.
- Q: When do you believe the State Legislature will enact substantive changes to how we pay for our transportation system?
- A: This is one of our most pressing issues and a top priority to me. I would like to see us pass parts of this plan and begin a discussion with the Senate within the next few weeks. The House Republican plan is now in committee and will be discussed and receive public input soon. That will help us improve the plan and find a stronger

- solution before it heads to the floor for a vote by the full House.
- Q: What has been your reaction to the public's increase in calls for increased infrastructure investment in Michigan?
- A: I believe that roads are a prerequisite to economic development and that we need a real, long-term solution to keep our economic recovery going. It is well past time for this issue to be resolved once and for all. Our plan will invest more than a billion dollars more into our roads every year, and we are going to dedicate that funding, so our roads stay a priority in Michigan for decades to come.

We intend to use the efficiencies associated with that process in the redesign of our DBE certifica-

tion application process to shorten that timeframe as well.


You will also see more web-based content making it easier to find information on a specific topic without having to read our entire procedures manual. We have updated our main webpage, www.michigan.gov/mdot-dbe, and will be adding additional pages that will give you specific information you need right when you need it. OBD currently has several program processes that are held as best practices by the Federal Highway Administration. It is my intent to build upon that distinction in all areas of operation.

For the DBE-certified companies in Michigan, what challenges do you see that impeded their success, and how will OBD help them overcome those challenges?

The Michigan economy is slowly recovering and all levels of government have been strapped for cash. In order to grow, DBEs and all other small businesses must have contracting opportunities. Government contracting opportunities are limited and competition is stiff, often leaving smaller firms struggling to survive. Our program must create opportunities for small firms without oversaturating any specific market and squeezing out non-DBE businesses doing similar work. We must keep our pool of DBE firms that can perform MDOT work current with limited work available for them to perform.

To help our firms become more competitive, the OBD has been working with partners who offer business development services that are targeted specifically to small firms and their growth needs. We are currently piloting programs with the Michigan **Economic Development Corporation** (MEDC) to provide general business assistance from trained professionals to help DBEs implement more efficient contracting principles and improve their bottom lines. We have also partnered with consultants who have hands-on project management experience to help firms make project-specific decisions that are in the best interest of their long-term business plan. We hope to continue and expand upon our partnerships with organization like the Michigan Infrastructure and Transportation Association (MITA), the American Council of Engineering Companies (ACEC), and the Construction Association of Michigan (CAM) and others to provide business and contracting assessment services, business planning and crisis management to position DBEs for a successful future.

OBD will continue to be one tool in a very large toolbox designed to develop strong small businesses that will create good paying jobs and continue growing Michigan's economy.



The timeliness and quality of work that allowed for the Northmen to play baseball for their 2014 season on the new field are factors that were considered in the award presentation. Work did not begin until June of 2013 and the playing surface was completed and

> seeded by August 9, 2013. In addition to installing sub surface drainage over 29,000 cubic vards of earth were moved and shaped to create the new ball field.

Cost savings were a part of the project and, with their prior experience in athletic field construction, Harbor Springs Excavating was able to contribute to this effort by using a mix of the specified field surface and a similar product available from one of their gravel pits. Additional savings were implemented by the owner with the elimination of the sand sub base for the outfield requiring operators from Harbor Springs Excavating to place additional effort in the final grading to create an acceptable well drained and graded playing surface with the existing stone and clay soils.

The general contractor on the job was Grand Traverse Construction and working carefully with them allowed for completion of the field well ahead of the surrounding concrete construction for the press box/ locker rooms, sidewalks and bleachers, aln addition timely work by the landscaper (Jim Hoffman & Sons) helped to minimize erosion on the heavy soils when record setting October rains hit the area.






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
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Outreach Coordinator Completes Government Affairs Academy
